Suncor Energy Foundation helps develop a vibrant and sustainable Fort McMurray

Community leaders come together to identify and collaborate on social and community building opportunities

Fort McMurray, Alberta (March 14, 2011) – More than 100 community leaders from Fort McMurray and area gathered in February at the Suncor Community Leisure Centre for a day-long session with Tamarack – An Institute for Community Engagement. Facilitated by renowned community builder and Tamarack president, Paul Born, the session’s aim was to implement a change agenda that will build long term non-profit and social capacity in support of Envision Wood Buffalo’s Statement of Sustainability for the region. Additional speakers included representatives from Suncor Energy, the city of Waterloo and mayor of the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo (RMWB), Melissa Blake.

The conference, supported by the Suncor Energy Foundation and hosted in “kitchen party” fashion, was the kick-off for the broader Developing Social Stability and Building Capacity in a Northern Community initiative that is being facilitated by the University of Waterloo. This initiative will connect community leaders from the Wood Buffalo and Waterloo regions in action learning teams to implement social change. It is also part of a larger action-based research project aimed at identifying ways to address impending regional opportunities and challenges through development of the community’s non-profit and social capacity.

“Suncor has passion and commitment for this community,” says Lori Gammell, manager of Community Investment and the Suncor Energy Foundation. “We’ve done a lot of research on how we can best support the well-being of the RMWB and are excited about this new approach to address systemic issues on a broad basis. We are interested in the long-term sustainability and resiliency of the community - not just bricks and mortar projects.”

This collaborative initiative, steered by the United Way of Fort McMurray, the RMWB, Suncor Community Leisure Centre, the Suncor Energy Foundation and the University of Waterloo, will challenge leading community agencies and individuals to work together to generate new, innovative solutions to support social stability and build community capacity.

“I think that going into the meeting, most of the folks were of the opinion that we *were* doing what was possible,” says Ray Floyd, senior vice president of Maintenance & Reliability at Suncor Energy and United Way of Fort McMurray board member. “It became clear as we went through the day that each of us was doing what was possible for ourselves, but if we all got together, we could make many more things possible.”

This initiative is part of a new strategy that the Suncor Energy Foundation is developing to change how they engage with communities of interest. The new program will go beyond simply allocating funds and will focus on the creation of sustainable communities through the development of collaborative and integrated solutions that address the unique needs of the area.

“The Suncor Energy Foundation is a group of innovative people known for critical thought about what is necessary in communities where their employees live and work,” says Tamarack president, Paul Born.

“The Foundation wants to be involved in long-term solutions and doesn’t just give money to one-off projects or initiatives. We wouldn’t have gotten involved otherwise.”

This Fort McMurray community conversation is the first of many with the next collaborative learning event scheduled for June 2011. Participants have formed action learning teams and will spend the next 18 months developing and implementing the ideas put forward during this first session. At the conclusion of the project, the Suncor Energy Foundation and their partner organizations hope to be able to share learnings with other resource-based communities in Canada.
